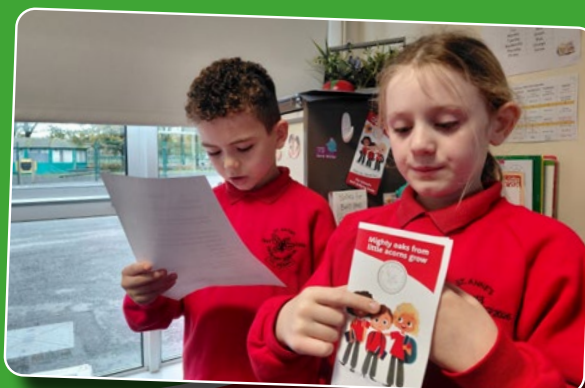

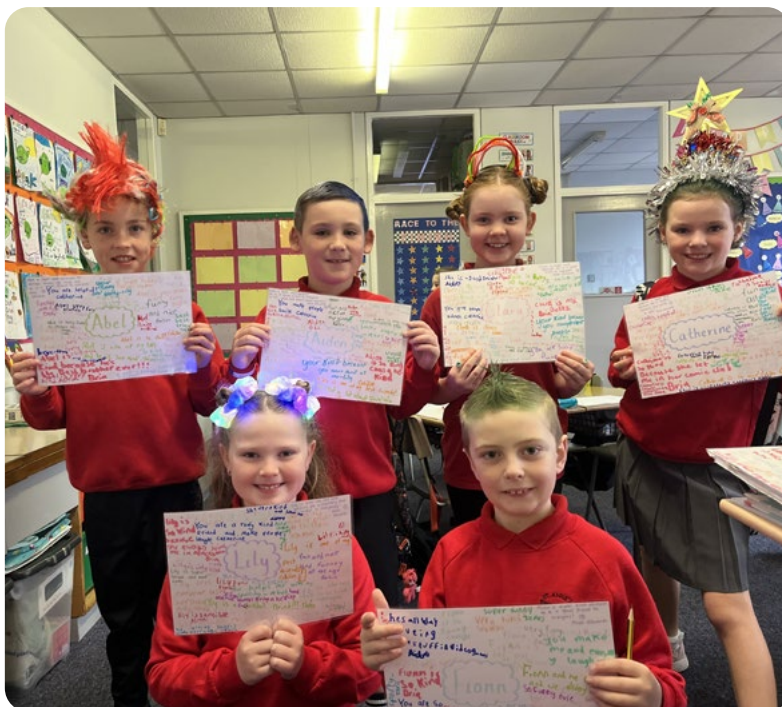

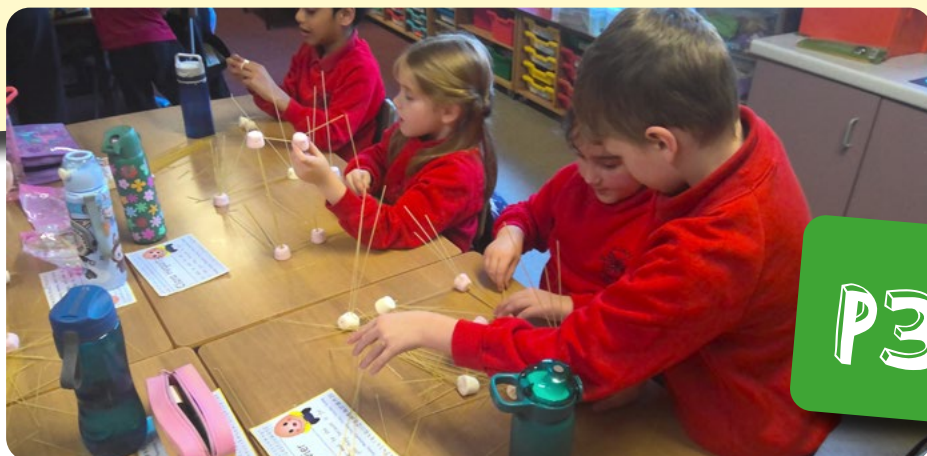
P3 Scientists at Play

Primary 3 have been enjoying a wonderful series of Playful Science lessons delivered by visiting science students. Over the past five weeks, the children have taken part in exciting, hands-on activities linked to our World Around Us topic of Celebrations.

The lessons began with the story *Mog's Birthday* by Judith Kerr, which became the inspiration for all of our investigations. Since then, the children have explored a wide range of scientific ideas through fun, interactive learning:

- **Sound:** We discovered how sound is made by creating and experimenting with our own balance drums.
- **Electricity:** We built simple electrical circuits to help make sure Mog wouldn't be afraid of the dark!
- **Light and Materials:** We investigated opaque, transparent and translucent materials to decide which would make the best curtains for Mog's living room so that the candles on her cake could be easily seen.
- **Protective Materials:** We explored which materials would best protect a fragile gift. We wrapped eggs using different materials and then carried out a drop test to see if our eggs stayed safe!

The children thoroughly enjoyed these playful and engaging science sessions, and they learned so much through investigation, creativity and teamwork.

Growing together

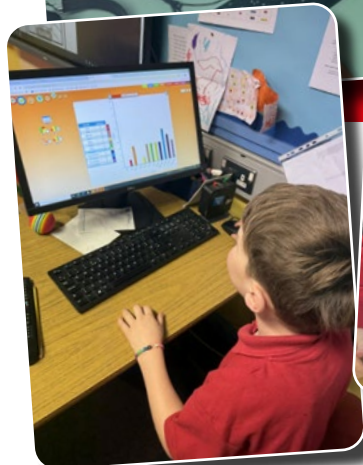
Fr Martin kindly donated daffodil bulbs to our school. He invited us to the church to bless the bulbs and then he showed us where we were going to plant them.

Learning by Doing

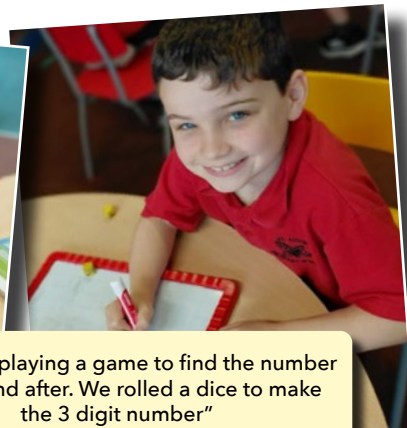

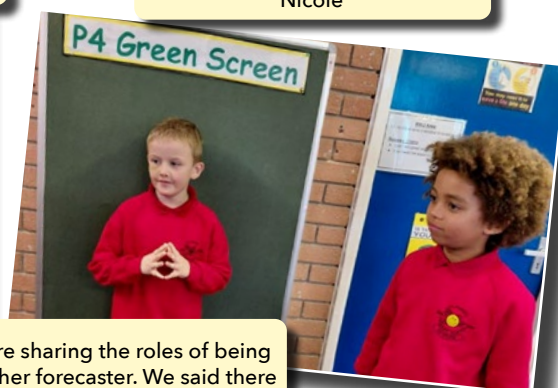

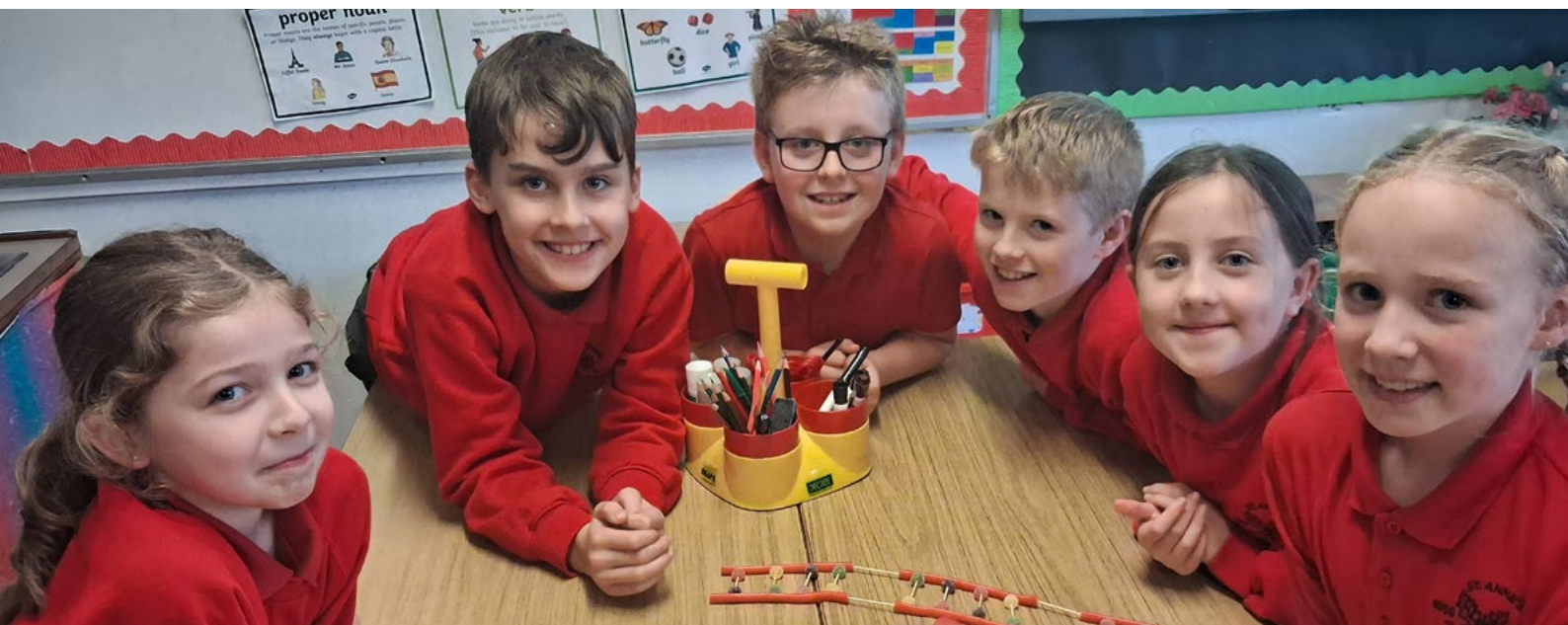

Flood Proof Fun

On Tuesday 14th October, our class had a visit from 4th year science student, Holly, from Stranmillis University. Holly came to our class to take a lesson based on our WAU topic, Dynamic Earth. The lesson was based on floods.

Holly began by talking to us about floods and then we watched a video of a flood that happened in Newry quite recently. We then discussed why floods happen and what can be done to prevent them. In groups, we had to design a flood barrier using only natural materials. We had to draw the barrier and list all of the materials that we thought would be useful.

After we talked through our design, we went outside and had to collect all the natural materials. We collected leaves, moss, grass, sticks, branches and stones. In our tray we had to build our flood barrier. It was so much fun to try and design the flood barrier and make sure it didn't collapse!
